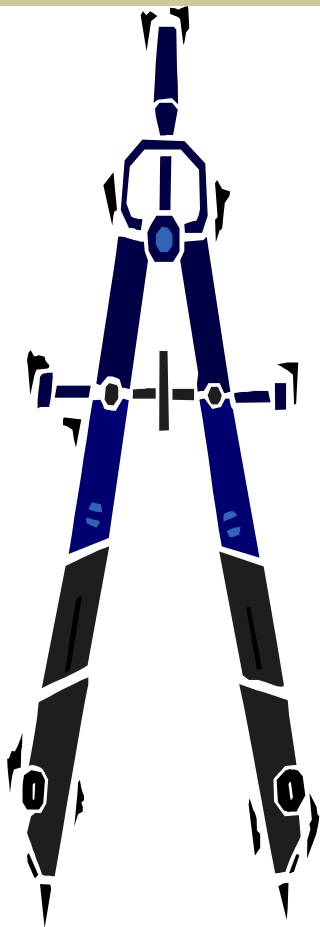

**ASL installs wireless internet access**

Campus computing services, in cooperation with the school of architecture and the ASL, has installed wireless internet access in the Paul B. Sogg Building.

This is part of a pilot project on campus. Other wireless access locations include the Book 'N Bean, the MSU, and the Boyd School of Law.

There are three access points positioned in the ASL, along with many more in SOA studio areas.

You'll need your valid RebelCard, a computer with an IEEE 802.11b/g or 802.11n wireless LAN network card, and a browser to get started.

**More network connections added**

The ASL and the library systems department have activated nearly 40 more network connections in the library. After a one-time registration, you can bring your personal laptop and plug in to our network. This high-speed internet service is free and available only to UNLV students, faculty, and staff. Look for marked study carrels, tables, and drops in the ASL.
