

# 11 Arrested in Protest on Atomic Tests

MERCURY, Nev., Aug. 6  
(AP)—Eleven pacifists deliberately marched into the prohibited area of the U.S. Atomic Energy Commission's Nevada test site today and were jailed for trespass in a demonstration marking the 12th anniversary of the atom bomb attack on Hiroshima.

Those arrested were 10 men and a woman led by Quaker Lawrence Scott of Chicago, co-ordinator for a well-publicized "peaceful demonstration against the senseless folly" of continued atomic experiments.

## **Holds Prayer Vigil**

The pacifists edged their way into the off-limits of this atomic site in groups of twos and threes, openly inviting arrest as they sought to penetrate the heavily guarded

mediately on trespass charges in a 20x20 foot cement block building with adjoining jail cells. All were found guilty but imposition of sentence was suspended on condition of no further violation for a year.
